The President's Message

The 2016 Thomian OBA Calendar was kicked off in February with our first ever Open Mic Night, followed by the AGM. The Open Mic Night was a success by all measures and the enthusiastic participation of several talented young and old Thomians suggests that the Open Mic Night will continue to be a popular fixture in the OBA calendar.

At the AGM, further to a lively discussion on finances, subscription payments, membership rolls and related matters, the new Executive Committee was elected. The introduction of credit card based payment facilities at the AGM allowed many of those present to pay their subs and also purchase OBA merchandise (cuff-links, ties, Thomian Crested shot glasses, etc.). In the next few months, we plan to further enhance our revenue collection capabilities with the introduction of internet banking (BPAY) and web based payment mechanisms.

A tipplers tale: Gin is in

The gin festival Junipalooza, is coming to Melbourne later this year. That's right an entire festival dedicated to gin. We thought it our civic duty to investigate this matter further on behalf of our readership and what we found left us in equal parts, shaken and stirred.

Yes it's true; James Bond did a lot for gin, which may have something to do with his creator, Ian Fleming drinking a bottle a day in his prime. Yet the story of gin goes back further- to the 18th century and the City of London, where parliament banned imports of foreign spirits, resulted in what was fondly referred to as the Gin Craze with gin described as Mother's Ruin. According to some reports, one in five households sold gin, resulting not only in a massive hangover, but also parliament passing the Gin Act in a desperate attempt to curb binge drinking. Too late though, gin was here to stay.


The current revival in London has a lot to do with a new crop of gin makers using a variety of techniques from the traditional to copper stills small enough to fit on a bar. It may also have something to do with the fact that gin has few rules in how you make it-as long as you start with a neutral grain spirit. So expect botanicals such as black tea, English wood, black pepper, white willow bark, apricot-even mango in your gin. Hence the claim that there are few drinks that offer such variation in terms of flavour as gin does.

How to make the perfect Gin and tonic

Fill a highball glass with ice to the brim, add gin and pour in your tonic-2 parts tonic to one part gin. The trick is not to stir; the tonic will do the mixing as you pour it in. A large peel of orange is the perfect garnish. Cheers! The gin revival has also resulted in a new breed of 'gintrepreneurs'. So look out for gins distilled by Sipsmith who use the traditional one-shot method (no concentrates or additives), the Gin Foundry (also responsible for Junipalooza), the East London Liquor Company and Half Hitch Gin.





Comrades and Creepers

- Selva Kanagasabai remembers Lorenz D'Silva

It is nearly a year since Lorenz passed on after a prolonged illness. My friendship with him goes back nearly 60 years to our days at STC, when we were team mates in athletics and rugby, finishing school in the same year, before commencing careers in plantation management, as trainees.

I should perhaps mention that since the old colonial days, such trainees were called "creepers": The origins of this term vary from literally creeping under tea bushes to gain an in-depth understanding of them to impressing on the young men (who in most cases were straight out of school) that they were amongst the lowest forms of life and at the very bottom of the plantation hierarchy!

My most vivid memories of my friend revolve around sport:

The D'Silva boys had a visible presence at college. There were several of them, all tall and either brothers or cousins. Their uncle, Mr Brookie D'Silva, popularly known as "Brookie" within the school as well as in wider athletic circles, was a larger than life personality. He was the senior Zoology teacher and passionate about that subject and athletics, but not necessarily in that order. To be within his inner circle, you had to be good in either one or the other, with athletics probably taking precedence. It was therefore no surprise that Lorenz as well as his younger brothers, Roger and Derek were immersed in athletics. With his height and good looks, Lorenz stood out amongst his competitors not only at STC but also at various other track and field meets, from zonal groups to national schools, the biggest being the annual Public Schools championships, popularly known as the "Pubs".

An athlete from a rival school once commented that our team had several female fans because Lorenz looked like Elvis Presley. Far from being complimented, Lorenz gave him a look that stopped any further speculation as the reasons for such support. His fans also included his sisters, who were admired from a distance as Lorenz kept a watchful eye on them and the D' Silva boys were also bigger than their friends! Due to his strong sense of responsibility as the elder brother, this protective mantle over his siblings and later his family, continued beyond their school years and through the various phases of their adult lives.

Lorenz specialised in field events, mainly the shot put and discus throw, winning these competitions year after year at STC and being appointed as the athletics captain in his final year. Competing in the Pubs that year, he was ahead of his opponents in the shot put

but the record eluded him in the preliminary throws. Even in those days we had performance enhancing stimulants: For us, these were orange juice laced with glucose! It is quite likely this did nothing to boost our efforts and consumed in bigger quantities, probably did more harm than good. However, our close friend Jit W was dutifully standing by with a bottle of the juice. Before his third attempt, Lorenz walked over, had a few sips, called our friend by his unflattering nickname that only a couple of us could use with affection and went on to set a new Pubs record. We later joked that it was the nickname that had produced the effort to achieve the result.

He was a role model and mentor in athletics to Roger and Derek, who followed him into the same events with success. Many years later, it was Lorenz that motivated Roger to set a national shot put record.

Most big made field athletes are not renowned for their speed. Lorenz was quite fast for his size and determined to make the sprint relay team. It was then the pre-metric 4 x 110 yards. He trained hard to be selected for the second lap. I used to run the first lap and we put in a lot of practice to get our baton change just right. The team was thrilled to break the public schools record.

In 1960, a schoolboy athletics team from Sri Lanka (then Ceylon) toured Melbourne for a series of dual meets here. Lorenz was the only member of the visiting team to win all his events against what was clearly very strong opposition.

He also took to rugby in his last school year, much against the wishes of Brookie, who feared that injury would put his athletics at risk. In his characteristic manner, Brookie once told me to "keep Lorenz out of rugger, men. That is a game for buffaloes, not top athletes like Lorenz". Playing on the wing, Lorenz was by far the biggest and strongest three quarter in school rugby. With a high knee action that made him difficult to tackle, no opponent was keen on doing so!

STC had started playing rugby only in 1955, many decades after Trinity and Royal, who were quite rightly acknowledged as the cream of school rugby in the country. In 1960, STC beat Trinity for the first time but lost to Royal. In the following year, we won convincingly against both Trinity and Royal, with Lorenz scoring tries in both those games. These dual victories lifted Thomian rugby to a new level, instilling in our future players the confidence and belief that that they were as good as the best. A few players from that team later served the national side with distinction.

Sadly, several from the 1960 and 1961 teams departed early and are no longer with us. No doubt, they are still enjoying the game that is "played up there"!

Lorenz also represented STC at cricket for two years as a successful strike bowler. Without doubt, he was one of the most outstanding sportsmen produced by STC, a school that has provided many champions for the country throughout its long history.








Book review: Memoirs of a Thomian

Dr. Saratchandra Buddhapriya de Alwis-Seneviratne, is a highly respected Obstetrician and Gynaecologist whose work in the Cayman Islands has won him the highest honours including the Award for 'Emerging Pioneer in Health Services'.



His book 'Memoirs of a Thomian' paints a picture of what it was like to attend S. Thomas College, Mt. Lavinia in the late 50's and early 60's, with entire chapters dedicated to aspects of school life; from boarding to teachers - including the many canings and punishments he received.

Dr. Seneviratne served as cricket captain at STC and the chapters on his cricket career will be of interest to all cricket lovers. We are pleased to give you an excerpt from the book, with the kind permission of the author:

"I recall one of my early matches for the College First Eleven, which was against St. Joseph's on our grounds in Mount Lavinia. Prior to the match, Warden Davidson, who incidentally scored no runs at his Royal-Thomian big match, gave us an inspiring talk after cricket practice, on the day preceding the match, which still rang in my ears when I walked into bat at number six. There had been a first innings collapse and we had very little runs on the score board. The six foot tall Brian Perumal was bowling left-arm in swingers from the pavilion end. Due to the breeze and his high arm action, the ball was moving in and causing much difficulty for the batsmen. His repertoire included a good bouncer and a Yorker.

All I could remember was Warden Davidson's words of advice, to hang on and earn the runs with good concentration. I still recall his words as if it were yesterday and repeat it ad naseum, to my son. "Score your first run, then get to ten, then get to twenty, then get to thirty and keep going in this manner diligently". That's what I tried to do! The first ball was moving in from the middle to the leg. I had instinctively got on to the front foot, way in front of the batting crease and was ready to drive only to hear a yell for L.B.W. I hopped in agony, as the ball had hit the toes of the front foot! I composed myself, thought of Warden's advice, and took my stance once more, with the silly mid-on hardly a couple of yards from me. The second ball was a bouncer, which fortunately struck the middle of my bat and fell down harmlessly at my feet. I should have got under it and let it go but I had got on to my toes and managed to keep it down. The silly mid-on got closer to intimidate the 16 year old me. The third ball was on the off and I remember throwing all I had at it in an effort to respond to the silly mind-on's intimidation but fortunately for me, I was not close to the ball! Instantly, I heard the entire pavilion screaming with anger to bat on!! It helped me think of the Warden's advice again and concentrate. I was able to top-score that day, making over half a century in about an hour. Next day, we had done well but had to bowl the last over to get the last wicket to win, before the end of the day's play.

Skipper Keith Labroy, gave me the ball and said "Come on! Get him! You can do it". I was bowling leg spin with two fielders "under the bat" at silly mid-off and silly mid-on. L.S. Perera was at silly mid-on. On the fifth ball of this last over, he dove in front and held on to a brilliant catch to give us a thrilling and memorable victory. I was extremely chuffed that Keith had the confidence to let me bowl the last over in one of my very first matches! To give a 16 year old the last over, with nine wickets down, spoke volumes for the confidence the captain had in his team.

All proceeds from the book go towards STC. The book is priced at rupees 1000 and is available from the STC OBA Secretariat, Sri Lanka. A limited number of copies are expected here in Australia.

THE ARCANE ART OF 'BUNCHING'

as explained by a Royalist

Not unlike old boys of other schools, old boys of Royal have a tendency to be stuffy. This stuffiness is manifested in various ways, including a tendency to dwell on the more civilised and civilising aspects of their time in Royal. But it's time to move from the lofty to the shifty; from the rarefied memories of the school at its best to the grubby, thuggish atmosphere that could sometimes pervade a twentieth-century Royal classroom or playground. It is time to thumb one's nose at the Marquis of Queensberry and move "below the belt".

Known and practised by schoolboys of all ages and all places, it is time to say a few words about what was known in twentieth-century Royal as "bunching". Known in Australia as the "squirrel grip", the term "bunch" would probably be defined for the uninitiated as follows in an unexpurgated dictionary of slang:

bunch v.t. to grip and sometimes squeeze the genitalia of another, usu. done by one male to another, but not necessarily with homoerotic intent – v.i. to perform an act of bunching – n. **buncher** one who bunches, **bunchee** the subject of the act of bunching (*Sri Lankan schoolboy slang*) [Orig. unknown, poss. an extrapolation from one conventional meaning of *bunch*, i.e. the act of drawing together in a bunch the components of the male genitalia].

It cannot be said with any certainty whether, had he been minded to write on the topic, Shakespeare would have penned the admonition "neither a buncher nor a bunchee be". Given the likelihood that his sonnets were not always directed at a member of the fairer sex, it may be surmised that he would not have objected to the practice of bunching. In any event, one may rhetorically pose the question: does there exist an old Royalist who has not at one time been a buncher or a bunchee?

At this juncture, it is necessary to insert some words of clarification. There could, after all, be some wives of old boys reading this piece and wondering whether they may be certain about the past, if not the present, sexual orientation of their beloved husbands. Rest easy, dear spouses. The act of bunching was in most instances devoid of any homoerotic intent. To assist in this clarification, it is appropriate to classify the types of bunching that were endemic during the 1970s and early 1980s at the College.

The first and most common form of bunching was the sado-bunch. As its name suggests, its purpose was purely and simply to inflict pain and embarrassment, by way of a quick, forceful, open-palmed tap on the victim's family jewels by the assailant.

Equally common was what can best be described as the ceremonial bunch. In many ways, this was not really a bunch at all. It was mutual and ritualistic. In this it can be likened to the act of two Eskimos rubbing their noses in greeting, or two society ladies proffering their cheeks to each other in a mock kiss, accompanied by a strident "Dah-ling...". The Royal variant involved a mutual feint by each party at the family jewels of the other, accompanied by words such as "Ado Abey, how are you, you bugger?". I can testify (no pun intended) to having seen this ritual performed at the Royal-Thomian Centenary Carnival in 1979 by two old boys, much to the consternation of the spouses who accompanied them and to the amusement of their young children who were also in tow.

Less common but more dangerous was the crypto-bunch. Here, without warning or fanfare, the assailant would sidle up to the victim from behind or from his side and, with the speed and ruthlessness of a polonga (Russell Viper) administer a sado-bunch.

Finally, one is left with the homo-bunch which, as its name suggests, was effected suggestively and with very different intentions from the other varieties of bunching described above.

It is customary for some old boys to end their articles with the salutation "Floreat": "may it flourish". Given the subject-matter of this piece, I am reluctant to do so. However, I have no doubt that Royal has bred, and will continue to breed, many leading exponents of the arcane art of bunching.


